

Southwest Corridor Light Rail Project Historic Resource Impacts

The Southwest Corridor Light Rail Project will bring enhancements to Barbur Boulevard with new sidewalks, better crosswalks, protected bike lanes bike and green infrastructure. This expansion results in adverse impacts to several historic resources along the Southwest Corridor.


As part of the project's environmental review process, we are working with state and federal partners to identify the impacts to historic resources and the actions we can take to mitigate these impacts.

Current designs indicate adverse impacts to 11 historic resources, mapped on pages two and three:

- Terwilliger Parkway
- Congregation Ahavath Achim's former Synagogue (3225 SW Barbur Blvd)
- Jewish Shelter Home (4133 SW Corbett Ave)
- SW Newbury Street Viaduct, SW Vermont Street Viaduct, and Oregon Electric Railway Overcrossing
- Rasumussen Village (4950 S Barbur Blvd)
- Capitol Hill Motel (9110 S Barbur Blvd)
- 11125 SW Barbur Boulevard
- 5350 Pasadena Street
- South Portland Historic District
 - o Primary Contributing Structures: 3425 SW 1st Ave; 3522-3524 SW 1st Ave
 - Secondary Contributing Structures: 338 SW Meade St; 230 SW Woods; 3124 SW Barbur Blvd; 105 SW Curry St
